1.2 (i) Flexibility of the Curriculum: CBCS/Core/Elective option / Open options

The college offers sixteen core courses having duration of six semesters and sixteen elective courses in each programme at undergraduate level under Choice Based Credit and Semester System and seven courses at postgraduate level under Semester system. Also, the college has Doctoral programme in Zoology with a commentable range of specialized areas.

The general structure of a first degree programme comprises 1) Language Courses 2) Foundation Courses 3) Core Courses in the Major subjects related to Degree Programme 4) Complementary Courses on allied subjects 5) Open/Elective Courses and 6) Project. The college provides sufficient and optimum academic flexibility for its students to enrich their skills based on aptitude. A student is free to take any core subject and associated combination of Complementary Courses offered by the College on the basis of eligibility criteria at the time of admission. A student is also free to select any Elective Course offered

by the parent department during 6th semester and any open course offered by other departments of the college during 5th semester. The College Level Monitoring Committee for CBCSS programmes provide necessary information and directions to student regarding the provisions for core courses, elective courses, open courses and extension activities in an academic session. Further, the department level monitoring committee ensure that students ascertain from the faculty advisor the suitability and usefulness of such Courses to increase the academic potential and opportunity/eligibility for higher studies.

3.26 Major Activities during the year in the sphere of extension activities and Institutional Social Responsibility

- The NSS Unit of the college constructed three houses for old aged women; adopted two children with poor economic background for their nutrition, health and studies. The unit could plant 250 trees in the year as part of environmental friendly activity. Further, the unit implemented Nakshathravana project by planting saplings of 27 different species as part of conservation strategies of plant biodiversity and planted 60 banana saplings under Kadalivana Project. The volunteers conducted blood donation camp, observed road safety week along with rallies and poster exhibitions, constructed a by-road in Alappuzha district, and participated in observation of AIDS day and Environmental day during 2015-16.
- The college offers its best service in the social service sector through a programme “Hridayapoorvam”. This programme serves the society as a small step to abolish the ever worst misery –Poverty. The mission operates in such a way that once in every month student representatives of the program collect lunch packet from the campus and distribute them among the poor patients in Government Hospital, Adoor. Student volunteers from NCC, NSS and other college clubs are also actively involved in this charity mission.
- NCC unit of the college conducted blood donation camp named “Sneha Thullikal” as an extension activity. The unit is active on blood donation to the needy persons outside and inside the campus, as and when required
- Women’s studies unit organized Visit to Gandhi Bhavan (a home for the abandoned and the destitute); distributed care kits to AIDS patients, and arranged promotional classes for usage of recycled paper bags among the public
- Department of Zoology carried out a biodiversity survey of regional birds and handed over the data to the WWF
- Department of Physics organized classes by faculty members and students of the department to nearby schools on India’s achievements in space (India on Mars) and conducted group discussion with students of nearby schools on “Abdul Kalam’s dreams on modern India”
- The department of English organized an environmental awareness programme and the department of Sanskrit organised an exhibition “Maneesha 2015”.
- The department of Hindi arranged a visit to an orphanage for inculcating social responsibility among the students

The department of Physics introduced software like Celestia and Stellarium to PG students and My Physics Lab to UG students. The same department encourages the use of Phet and ICT based websites like school.co.uk and Science education at Jefferson lab. The department of Zoology gives training programmes on virtual lab exercises for all students for learning process through virtual lab with Physio Ex 9.1 software for physiology practical. Research & Extension forum of the college gives continuous training to the research scholars and faculty on software packages in the area of toxicology, biodiversity, soil biology and on other applied themes. All the science departments, departments of Commerce, History, Economics, Political Science and English have individual internet facility and give access to students. Further, the college has a common computer lab which provides training to students, on “basics of computer and internet”. The computer lab has internet facility too. Besides, IQAC monitors training and orientation programme on ICT enabled teaching to the required teachers, with the help of internal expertise.

5.6 Details of student counselling and career guidance

5.8 Details of gender sensitization programmes

Women's Study Unit (WSU) of the college plays a pivotal role in the overall development of girl students. WSU initiated a variety of themes such as creating awareness, sensitization, counselling and cultural programmes. The unit also addressed the need of the girl students and ensured the growing demands of the day. An emphasis was given to environment protection too. The programmes during the year 2015-16 were:

1. Cyber crime awareness class

In order to create awareness among students regarding the dangers of cyber world, WSU organized an awareness class on 16th February 2016. The class was conducted by Vinayakumaran Nair, DYSP, Cyber Cell, Trivandrum. He discussed through case studies how to combat this social evil and also narrated in detail the legal provisions such as Information Technology Act 2000.

2. Awareness Class for Health and Hygiene

As part of enhancing the knowledge about healthy life style of girls, WSU organized an awareness class. It was conducted by Dr. Kavitha, an experienced gynaecologist, who answered the doubts of girl students regarding their health problems. She talked about polycystic ovarian syndromes. PCOS is a common problem among teen girls and young women. In fact, almost 1 out of 10 women have PCOS. If PCOS is not treated properly, it can put a girl at risk for lots of problems. The most important step is diagnosing the condition, because getting treatment for PCOS reduces a girl's chances of developing serious problems. She issued handbooks that contain information about PCOS.

6.3 Quality improvement strategies adopted by the institution for each of the following:**6.3.1 Curriculum Development**

Since the college is affiliated to University of Kerala, the curriculum development process is undertaken by duly constituted academic bodies like Academic Council, Board of Studies and Faculty. The college takes active interest in sending the faculty to represent in such academic bodies. It is noteworthy that at present, one among the faculty represents as academic council member of the University, one among the faculty represent as senate member of the University, eight faculties represent as members of board of studies.

Further, the college has developed curriculum for value added programmes which are programmes other than those courses under the purview of the affiliating University. The institution offers twenty six value added programmes for skill development purposes. These programmes are aimed at apt placement for its outgoing students in a globally competing career environment. Further, the students are encouraged to learn the core concepts through ‘learning by doing’, through these value added courses, for self sustaining purposes and to focus on the pre-requisites of the companies offering jobs after the course.

The college has fourteen clubs as part of social and extension curricular activity of students. It is mandatory for students to participate in any one of the social service/extension activities of the college. Every student who is part of the third term and fourth semester is associated and engaged himself in the activities of anyone of the clubs, which functions in the college. It is compulsory to secure minimum attendance [40 hours]. Each club functions under the effective guidance of a convener. Students have the freedom to choose more than one club.

6.3.2 Teaching and Learning

- For quality management in teaching and learning, the college:
 - ✓ Ensure adequacy of teachers according to the required teacher-student ratio.
 - ✓ Formulate academic calendar for individual departments and examination calendar with the help of internal examination committee in the beginning of the year and students are informed.
 - ✓ Monitor academic procedures through College Level Monitoring Committee (CLMC) and give necessary feedbacks to the departments on academic activities.
 - ✓ Offer bridge courses to I Semester students in the first and second week
 - ✓ Consolidate monthly attendance and credits thus earned and the progress is reported to the authority and parents by faculty advisors and department level monitoring committee.
 - ✓ Offers remedial coaching to the needy under the supervision of UGC committee
 - ✓ Conduct two internal examinations for each class every semester in addition to assignments and seminars for the purpose of continuous evaluation.
 - ✓ Collect, compile and analyze the feedback from the students on term-basis for monitoring efficiency of teaching and evaluation practices
- Further, the department of English conducts academic enrichment programme “coffee time” which focused on postgraduate students. Department of Sanskrit conducted spoken Sanskrit class “Samskritha Sambhashana Sibiram” to enhance the speaking skills of students.
- Science departments such as Biochemistry, Zoology, Botany and Physics introduced virtual lab techniques to the students for practical sessions. In collaboration with Amrita University, the students of these departments are registered in the online virtual lab portal. The department of Physics introduced software like Celestia and Stellarium to PG students and My Physics Lab to UG students. The same department encourages the use of Phet and ICT based websites like school.co.uk and Science education at Jefferson lab.

6.3.3 Examination and Evaluation

- The college has an internal exam committee which monitors the regular conduct of at least two internal exams for all courses in a semester.
- The College Level Monitoring Committee and Department Level Monitoring Committee and faculty advisors monitor the continuous evaluation of students as part of formative assessment.
- Department of Physics and Chemistry conducted open book exams during this academic session with an objective to develop the skills of critical and creative thinking.
- Teacher evaluation by students is done through a formal feedback mechanism which is done at the end of every academic year.

6.3.4 Research and Development

The college has a research committee co-ordinated by Dr.M.G.Sanalkumar, Asst.Professor, Dept. of Zoology. Research and Extension division of the college is a common forum for teachers to co-ordinate research and extension programmes in the college. The forum aims at the promotion of inter disciplinary research as well as socially useful, productive activities in the college.

- The department of Geography procured new equipments with a total outlay of Rs. 2,17,115/- and enhanced the new laboratory in the year 2015-16.

6.3.6 Human Resource Management

47.57% of the teaching faculty in this institution are entrusted with decentralized administrative powers and responsibilities for smooth functioning of the college. Various Statutory bodies, committees, schemes and clubs give ample support to the management and administrative authority of the college for curricular, co-curricular, extra-curricular activities and other main functions of the college. The college has a Human Resource Management Cell which conducts a best practice “Collegium”, for the optimum utilization of resourcefulness of faculty through interdepartmental and intercollegiate lectures on topics of daily life applications to students. The pool of resource faculties are also made available to other colleges and schools for sharing the knowledge.

6.3.7 Faculty and Staff recruitment

Four substitute lecturers were recruited in the FIP vacancy aroused in four departments. Additional staffs on daily wage basis were recruited, with the financial assistance from PTA, for proper maintenance of women’s rest room and the existing premises and a new security officer was recruited for the institution this year.

6.3.8 Industry Interaction / Collaboration

- Research centre in Zoology has built up collaboration with Kerala State Biodiversity Board, Kerala Forest Research Institute and ALINT industries in terms of consultancy in river monitoring, biodiversity assessment and chemical analysis.
- Department of Zoology in collaboration with WWF and Forest Department, Govt. of Kerala, participated in regional bird survey programme and handed over the database to the authority.
- Department of Sanskrit has collaboration with Viswasamskrita Prathishtanam and Mannam Ayurveda Medical College, as part of language enrichment & teaching-learning programmes.

- World Migratory Birds Day, World Wetland Day, World Environmental Day, National Science Day and Ozone Day were observed by departments of Zoology, Physics and Botany through the conduct of seminars with the assistance from KSCSTE, State Biodiversity Board and Directorate of Environment and Climate Change.
- Department of History conducted fortnight celebrations and interdisciplinary seminar with Malayalam and Sanskrit departments for the purpose of sharing knowledge base among students.
- Department of Sanskrit conducted one week programme “Sanskrita Sambhashana Sibiram” as part of literary enrichment among the students.
- Department of Economics organised student enrichment programme Budget Bytes and department of Commerce organised seminar on SPSS for PG students.
- National Service Scheme Unit of the college constructed three houses for old aged women; adopted two children with poor economic background for their nutrition, health and studies. The unit could plant 250 trees in the year as part of environmental friendly activity. Further, the unit implemented Nakshathravana project by planting saplings of 27 different species as part of conservation strategies of plant biodiversity and planted 60 banana saplings under Kadalivana Project. Feedback analysis report

The institution has a feedback mechanism for assessing teaching faculty, course and institution by administering a questionnaire among outgoing students. From the feedback obtained, a report is prepared and discussed at the academic committee meetings of the college. During 2015-16, the feedback was taken from students for the evaluation of the afore mentioned parameters.

Students were instructed to rate their faculty on the basis of ten attributes on a five point scale (excellent/good/average/below average/poor). Analysis revealed that all the teachers were rated good for their ability to create interest in the subject and 25% of the teachers are yet to improve with respect to the ability to integrate course material with current environment. The analysis on evaluation of teachers by students revealed that about 79% of the teachers are good in communication skill in terms of articulation and comprehensibility. Rest of the teachers was rated as average in the same parameter. Ability of teachers to design assignments, examinations to test the understanding of the course were rated excellent and good, but at the same time 4% of the teachers are to be improved in designing the projects. Students opined that all the teachers are accessible in and out of the class, but at the same time 12% of the faculties are to be improved in communication/interaction with the students outside the class. All teachers were rated good in providing timely feedback to students throughout the course. Students had good opinion about the knowledge base of teachers. Excellent rating was given to all the teachers on commitment and sincerity towards students.

An analysis on feedback from students for evaluation of institution revealed that, the general academic atmosphere is above average and teachers' guidance in academic activities is excellent. Accuracy and correctness of continuous assessment were rated good. Coursework preparation of teachers and their participation in co-curricular activities were rated above average. Library and laboratory facilities are very good. Students strongly agreed that they got good encouragement for participation in extracurricular activities and got very good opportunity to participate in sports activities through physical education department. There is an above average chance of getting admission to higher studies in the same discipline after pursuing course from this institution. All the students strongly agreed that they can accept teachers as their academic models. Students rated the institution high in organizing seminars and invited lectures. 90% of the students recommend the institution to other students. But, students had an opinion that there should be improvement in college union and its activities.

Course evaluation by students showed that, they are able to apply what they have learned to their future task and agreed that the academic content of the course satisfies the stated objectives. Majority of the students have the opinion that the resource materials were of good use in the class. Students also agreed that the course included enough practice work and adequate theory background. Overall rating of course and institution was excellent.

BEST PRACTICES OF THE COLLEGE**I. ‘Collegium –The domain of Debate and Discourse’**

The vision of the practice is that teaching, learning and sharing is the need of the hour. It is obvious that the college has a resource pool and a host of subjects for sharing knowledge. With all the confidence tinged with humility, the college open corridors both to learn and teach, to share and spread the pollens of knowledge. The focal themes were

Both interdepartmental and intercollegiate lectures are given by the resource persons of the collegiums. ‘Collegium –The domain of debate and Discourse’ is a programme organised by the Human Resources Development Cell where a pool of resource persons volunteered to commit themselves in the “Knowledge Saga of teaching, learning and sharing” and is co-ordinated by Sri.Vinod P., Asst.Professor in the department of Zoology. This knowledge sharing worked on the paradigm of group learning applications . The cell also arranged counselling sessions to students to have better vision and orientation towards goal setting .Above all it also serves as a platform to guide students with regard to their career options through career development programmes from in-house experts and creative thinkers

Objectives:

- To conduct an interdisciplinary discourse during zero hours, to increase the awareness levels of the students in various subjects
- To add a competitive advantage to students’ intellectual capital
- To bring an asset dimension to the academic fraternity and scholars.
- To foster bonding with lateral establishments through programme like Collegium which gave outside consultancy services.

Implementation Strategy

- The classes were arranged in a schedule where the availability of the resource persons and the students was duly taken into consideration.
- An average of 48 classes was arranged during the year 2015-16
- Each resource person was given classes other than his /her core students
- Efforts were taken to maintain the probability of giving all department classes judiciously
- Minimum 40 hrs of class a year
- Evaluation and Feedback from the students as well as the concerned Department heads were taken
- Recommended classes were again rescheduled
- Further, a legal awareness programme for faculty and students was arranged and led by Deputy Superintendent of Police, Adoor.

II. Hridayapoorvam: A Mission to Heal the Wound of Hunger

Goal: Helping the poorest of the poor in the society by extending a packet of food once in every month by students and staff of the college.

Context:

“Hunger moves minds to evil” - Krut Hamson

India is a country with developing economy where a vast majority of the people is living at subsistence level. The problem to the constitution of India stresses the importance of ‘Justice – Social, Economic and Political’. Social justice is mentioned first and other two come second and third in order of preference.

This in itself indicates that the makers of our Constitution realized the significance and power of social justice. Social service as a part of social justice is very much relevant in the contemporary Indian social and cultural scenario.

In India, unfortunately the social services are so poor that the upbringing of weaker section of the society can hardly be said to exist. We have a surplus stock of (233.92 million tons) of food grains and millions of tons gets spoiled for want of storage every year, but a good number of our population still die of hunger. The poor and inequitable distribution system of food- stuff is a big problem of modern India.

Practice:

N.S.S.College, Pandalam offers its best service in the social service sector through “Hridayapoorvam” this mission upholds the major vision of the college “They serve good well who serve its creatures”. Once in every month student representatives of this program collect Lunch packet from the campus and distribute them among the poor patients in Government Hospital, Adoor. More than one thousand packet can be collected and distributed. Sri. P.B. Anil, Asso. Professor in the department of Political Science is the teacher-in-charge and the chief organizer of this mission during the present academic year.

This service thus serves the society as a small step to abolish the ever worst misery –Poverty. Student volunteers from NCC, NSS and other college clubs are also actively involved in this charity mission. The support and guidance of entire teaching faculty, non teaching staff and PTA, is the driving force behind this great activity. Such services make a positive impression in student’s personality and encourage them to offer their energy and youth in the well being of our society.

We are liable to boost of our development in science and technology and advancement in almost all the fields of modern development but on the other hand our heads bow with shame to see over millions root in extreme poverty. So it is the primary duty of the civilized society to create at least the minimum conditions of good life for every individual before it sanctions indulgence in luxury and conspicuous consumption.

Contributions: Dress and food kits were distributed to children, who are inmates of Children’s home at Alappuzha District. Food packets were distributed to the people who are helpless, poor, disabled and abandoned during 2015-16. Benefited community includes inpatients of Government general hospital at Adoor, Pathanamthitta District.
